


Most of the 1st cutting alfalfa has been cut with below average production. Many acres of rye and winter wheat are being baled as well and spring wheat is just starting to head out.


Bean leaf beetles are still showing up in fields that did not use insecticide treatment.

Corn staging is V4-V5, and soybeans are V1-V2.


The soybeans in my area are uneven in a few spots with the dry soil conditions and depth.


Post herbicide application on corn are finishing up and have started on soybeans.

I'm telling all my farmers to be cognizant of insect pressure in these hot and dry conditions.




Its appears like the rain on June 8 was only in the northern area of my territory. Corn is V5- V6 and soybeans are V2- V3.


Corn is V2-V5 across my terrritory and the replant beans are popping through and finally seeing those areas come back from the last week's weather.




The Jamestown to Edgeley area caught weather Monday night in to Tuesday. Most of the area north of I-94 and west is still very dry.


There were some very severe storms and damaging wind and hail.


Corn has perked up after last week's heat and spraying is on track despite the wind!

A few bean fields that got plenty of moisture look great.


Some replanting is still going on and will continue through the week. The west side of the river still can't catch a rain but the east side of the river is starting to turn around and look good.






We are seeing some spotty wind damage from the 70mph winds overnight recently.


Our crop stages are all over the board and beans keep getting set back. The rain was very welcomed and it really helped the corn.


Proabably going to be all over the board all the way to harvest with the way it looks right now.


Emergence and stand is all over the board with the dry soils.


The rainfall yesterday was from .2" to 1.5" across my terrritory. The storm south of Fargo the other night did a lot of damage to some farmsteads and crops.

The crop conditions go from good to not good, often in the same field. Crop development is delayed from the moisture stress.


We dodged the severe weather so far. Some areas received small amounts of rain over the weekend.


We are still seeing some seed going out and I've fielded a few frost damage calls. Basically, the only consitanency is variability.


We are getting drier as the days pass. The area south of the interstate is looking pretty good, however, without rain, it will be showing stress soon.


It's amazing how fast the corn is streching. The beans seem to have slowed down a little and are protecting themselves from the heat.

WEEKLY NOTES

Hunter: Our whole area missed the rains so stands are still uneven. Where stands were established, we're sitting ok as there is still some moisture. We have a little IDC showing up as well as we are in the stage where it doesn't seem to matter what bean it is they're all yellowing to some degree. Corn spraying is about done and it is really taking off where we have subsoil moisture. I've been in a few fields that will be over knee high over the next few days and some that haven't grown an inch since the heat started.

Prosper: The Prosper area is very similar to Hunter but we caught anywhere from 1" to nothing of the rain. Some replant is going on, mostly from the wind and dry conditions. A ton of weeds have emerged in the last week, mainly waterhemp. The wheat is stressed from the lack of moisture with a few fields starting to head out already.

Kindred: We recived 1-2" of moisture in our area from that last system but it also brought some hail and more wind damage. Corn that froze is back up and running but those plants are now 2-3 stages behind the ones that were not damaged. IDC has really flaired up showing up in spots where we don't usually see it, even on some typically resistant varities. Replants are about done and farmers are in the middle of spraying.
